Studio Technical – Switcher (Winnipeg)

Reporting to the Manager of Operations, under the direction of the Television Director and Producer(s), the Switcher assists in the daily production of APTN News and Current Affairs programming, and special events coverage.

Key Responsibilities:

- Operates production switcher, remote control robotic cameras and similar equipment;
- Creates and builds DVE consistent with program style and APTN visual standards;
- Recalls prebuilt effects and performs on-air transitions/effects as required;
- Assists with coordinating and readying technical crew in anticipation of fax checks, rehearsals and live or live to tape telecasts;
- Communicates with Television Director or Producer(s) on show preparation;
- Communicates closely with Broadcast Technologists on patching and signal routing issues on all feeds incoming and outgoing prior to and throughout production;
- Operates camera control units to ensure that optimum video levels and colour temperature are output from studio cameras, consistent with APTN technical standards;
- The Switcher is an integral member of the Studio Technical team, and assists other team members as needed.
- Travel and shift work may be required.

Requirements:

- Diploma or certificate from college or university and three to five years related experience; or equivalent combination of education and experience;
- Television Broadcast experience;
- Knowledge of news room automation;
- Knowledge of, Internet software, e-mail, and broadcast industry technology;
- Knowledge of French and/or at least one Aboriginal language would be an asset.
